Learning from our Elders the children have learnt how to survive. The family symbol represents the family centre that accepts children of all ages and colour and making children feel safe at heart. Investing in the Youth is about differing people coming together and nurturing the young people giving them a guiding hand on surviving as adults."

Our Commitment to Child Safety

Investing In Our Youth is unwavering in its commitment to the safety, empowerment, and participation of all children, especially the most vulnerable. We maintain a zero-tolerance stance against any form of child abuse or exploitation and have established, robust policies and procedures to ensure the protection of program participants. This includes rigorous screening and background checks for individuals working with children, alongside mandatory orientation and training on our policies and reporting requirements.

Our approach involves proactive risk management and strict adherence to legal obligations for reporting concerns about child safety. We are dedicated to fostering an inclusive environment that supports diversity, with particular attention to the cultural safety and empowerment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, those from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, and children with disabilities.
